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Local optometrists lend a hand for "Special Olympics – Opening Eyes" program

The goal of the "Opening Eyes" program is to help improve the vision for people with developmental disabilities, as well as educating the public, parents and coaches about the importance of vision to the athletes' performance in sports, school and work.

Throughout this two-day event, volunteer optometric physicians from the NJSOP generously volunteered their time to give free eye screenings and exams to approximately 400 athletes. According to Special Olympics Incorporated, these athletes are representative of a vastly underserved population. In fact, few of the 7.5 million people with mental retardation receive adequate eye care, with many having never visited an eye doctor before.

The mission of Special Olympics is to provide year-round sports training and athletic competition in a variety of Olympic-type sports for children and adults with intellectual disabilities. Athletes are given opportunities to develop physical fitness, demonstrate courage, experience joy and participate in a sharing of gifts, skills and friendship with their families, other Special Olympics athletes and the community.
